I don't know when Vivian first joined the Utica/Rome Sail and Power Squadron; it was long before I became a sailor. She and Past Commander Earl (deceased) were members when I joined in 1976. The ladies then belonged to the Utica Power Squadron Auxiliary.

When our squadron took a leadership role in advocating that women be welcomed to regular membership, Vivian joined the squadron, along with most of the rest of our group of Captains' Ladies, as we were then introduced at Squadron functions.

Vivian grew up in Ohio, was high school valedictorian, and obtained a degree in Education from the University of Akron. She and Earl were married in Akron in September, 1950.

Vivian taught fifth grade until Earl was posted to Rome Air Development Center in 1954. Her life was enriched as she mothered her 3 sons, Kenneth, David, and Charles, and served in increasingly important roles in her church. She loved to travel, especially in Cape Cod and California. Her hobbies included crewel work, other embroidery, and art.

As I came to know Vivian, she impressed me as a quiet, intelligent woman who always lent a helping hand. In addition to intelligence, she had an outstanding memory.

As a living "corporate memory" she was simply amazing. During discussions about when and where a certain event was held, who was in charge, and what happened; Vivian usually stopped any debate with something like, "No, it was April, 1975. Remember, that was the year that we had that freak late snowstorm, and members were forced off the Thruway when the Thruway Authority closed it because of poor visibility. We were on our way to the District Conference at Grand Island." She could recount the stories of other delayed members who arrived in Grand Island after fearing for their lives in a Western NY spring snowstorm. There were times when she seemed to me like a history teacher, reading from an invisible text!

We learned to trust Vivian's memory bank. "Vivian, when did..., who was..." She seemed always to know the dates, names, places, and events. And she remembered the big and little things that gave a special flavor to her history lessons.

A great corporate memory has been lost. I miss the woman and I miss her great memory.

LT. RICHARD A. SMITH, P

It is with great sorrow that I note the passing of my friend of over 30 years, Richard A. Smith, better known to our family as “Stinky.”

I first met Richard a few days after he had joined the Lake Delta Volunteer Fire Department. As I watched the fire truck he was riding in skid on the ice and rolled down the hill off Elmer Hill Road, I recalled that Richard broke his eye glasses in the roll over, but he it never had his spirit broken. He remained an active firefighter and EMT until the day of his death.

Richard came to Rome as an Air Force officer after a tour of Vietnam with a degree in Agricultural Economics. Richard’s love was farming and he and his young family were able to purchase what became Smith’s Last Chance Farm on Elmer Hill Road in Rome.

As time passed I spent more and more time with Richard and his farming activities, shoveling the barn and getting in hay. Soon thereafter there was the first energy crises. Joined by Mike Kunkel the three families began to use our own form of alternative energy sources by cutting firewood.

I had a truck and a chainsaw, Richard had a place to dump the stuff, and Mike supplied the labor and willingness to cut the trees that Richard and I were afraid to touch. Wood cutting and all the rest of the farming activities progressed to the point where we decided to Richard should expand into horse boarding. You see, our girls all decided they wanted to own and ride horses.

The concrete came out of half of the barn floor and wooden stalls went in as well as an outside paddock. We had a horse named Satin who joined Lauren Smith’s Jody and Kathy Kunkel’s Little Satin with a host of other horses in Richard’s barn.

All of the children grew up on and about Richard’s farm. In fact our son Martin’s first job was helping Smith on the farm every Tuesday and Saturday cleaning the barn. When he eventually applied for a job at Burger King he listed his previous occupation as Agricultural Technician. Seems he would rather shovel burgers than the other stuff.

One bright summer day Mike Kunkel found a 47-foot pontoon houseboat for sale on Sandy Pond that we named “Incredulous”. Skipping the details of the adventure of making the voyage and sailing from Lake Ontario to Rome, Incredulous became a new summer play thing for us all.

About this time, Richard and I took a Public Boating Course offered by the United States Power Squadron and accepted the invitation by instructors Dr. Dave Ellison and Harry Winberg to join the Utica Squadron. Seamanship and Piloting classes later, Richard and I signed on as instructors to teach the Public Boating class of which we have done countless times since.

I went on to buy “Summerplace” and Richard bought “Daddy’s Playpen”. Yep, you got the name right.

Richard and I always had an agreement, he would fix the mechanical things that broke and I would fix the “wooden” things that needed fixing.

Richard, Mike and I were three experts at collective decision making. Mike and I would make the decision and Richard would do something. I recall meeting in the parking lot of the Rome Board of Education where on the last day, Mike and I got Richard signed up to run for a seat on the Board, which he won and did a great job.

I also recall that we were part of getting him invited to be Chairman of the Rome Parking Authority, where he served with distinction for many years.

There was however in Richard a desire to help better the community without any prodding from us. With no help from us he continued as an Officer in the Air Force Reserve until retiring as a Lt Colonel, as well as a valued federal employee. He served on the board of Directors of the Americu Credit Union and was an advisor and active SCORE member.

Richard was much more than this and a second father to our children, teaching lessons that they could never have learned from any other source.

Of the three of us, Richard, Mike and I, Richard always called me, the oldest by a few years, the “lead the force”. If you are not familiar with this Air Force term, it means the one plane that you flew as much as possible under the most adverse conditions to learn what could be expected to go wrong with the rest of the fleet. Well Richard, you are the new “lead the force”. Keep the path well lighted and good sailing until we meet again.

Now we can always think about participating in or teaching a USPS member course or help with the fall public boating course. We need all the help that we can get. You all have experiences and special knowledge to share with your fellow members. You should know that Seamanship is the first course that is intended for new members. In fact I just learned after 10 years plus in this boating club that national will not allow a member to use the grade of P or AP until they have completed Seamanship. So this fall we will offer Seamanship on Thursday evenings from 1900 to 2100 hours at the Whitesboro High School. This course will start on 2 October and should finish by 20 November. We will be using a new book that we beta tested two years ago with very positive acceptance. I am looking forward to working with the 6 members who have signed up so far. Other members who may have missed my phone call are most welcome to sign up by contacting me.

Our second advanced grade course will be Advanced Piloting (AP) to be very ably taught by Commander George Peckingham. This course will start with a review of Piloting concepts and plotting skills so that a few people who didn't finish the Piloting course last spring can take the P final exam. All of the 7 members who are pre-registered in this course will want to have some review so they should plan to start on Tuesday 23 September at 1900 in Whitesboro High School. George will be most attentive to the use of GPS waypoints in plotting a course and their subsequent use in running the course as review items for the Piloting exam. GPS usage is strongly integrated into the AP course.

Supporting Membership in USPS

Membership in USPS is always a top priority item for every Commander and it should be for all of our members. As your SEO, I receive many phone calls from boaters who feel that they need a boating safety course. Since they are not all personal watercraft owners, I try to learn what their needs are for boating education. We have picked up some new members in recent years with this technique of questioning and explaining and encouraging folks to join us. Since our national organization has encouraged us to accept new members who are experienced boaters without meeting the public boating safety course requirement, we can put these people right into our member courses that meet their needs.

We also have a program called the "Power of One". This program highlights the importance and effectiveness of the individual member who recruits new members. We all know other boaters who can benefit from membership in our club. Your help is needed to talk to your boating friends about USPS membership. Our national website (www.usps.org) has a membership page that will help you sell the many benefits of membership.

At one time in my career I worked on the road as a salesman for Carnation Milk Co. Naturally this travel involved expenses and the company wanted to keep expenses at a minimum. I was told that the profit margin was such that selling \$40 was equivalent to saving \$1. It was a lot easier to save a buck by careful spending than to sell \$40 worth of goods. Likewise it should be easier to keep a USPS member than to recruit a new member. We do try to keep our members involved but we don't always succeed. Some older members continue to pay their dues to support our mission of teaching public boating safety. We really appreciate that because we know that we are helping to save lives on the water. We also phone members who become delinquent in payment of their annual dues to find out why we aren't meeting their needs.

It should be obvious that membership recruiting and retention is not a one person job. Your help is needed.

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
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
